

A Musical Voyage Led by Legendary Pianist **Leon Fleisher**




Leon Fleisher's performances and recordings still stand as the gold standard for many of the great works of the piano literature and his personal story—losing the use of his right hand in the prime of his life, then, decades later, regaining its use—is as heartbreaking as it is

life affirming. His story is the subject of the Academy Award-nominated documentary film, *Two Hands*. Fleisher was one of a select group of classical artists to receive The Kennedy Center Honors and, in 2010, Doubleday published his memoir, *My Nine Lives*.

As pianist, conductor, and teacher he continues to share his original and compelling musicianship in music centers around the world. The current season includes performances in such cities as New York, Washington, DC, Chicago, Toronto, London, and Paris, among others. He tours the U.S. as soloist with the Irish Chamber Orchestra with "Prokofiev Concerto No. 4", a work he will also play with Jurowski and the London Philharmonic, and he will conduct the Scottish Chamber Orchestra, Toronto Symphony, and Radio Philharmonique in Paris. Drawing upon the success of his five Carnegie Hall workshops, his memorable university masterclasses and residencies illuminate music for students here and abroad.

He will be joined by his wife, Kathy Jacobson-Fleisher, and his children, Deborah, Richard, Leah, Julian, and Paula, who will perform alongside him during the voyage.

Onboard Enrichment Program

As Captain Alfred McLaren has said, the Black Sea's "dark and mysterious nature has fascinated and challenged seagoing explorers, traders, and colonists from the earliest of times." From his perspective as one of its more recent seagoing explorers, Captain McLaren will introduce us to the unique marine environment of the Black Sea and to the contributions of underwater archaeology to our knowledge of the peoples who have inhabited the region. Maxim Tarnowsky will focus his lectures on contemporary issues in this region of strategic importance, particularly on recent politics in the Crimea and on the exploitation of oil and the control of its delivery.

Study Leaders



Captain Alfred S. McLaren, U.S. Navy (Ret.), Ph.D., is an Arctic and deep-sea explorer, climate change research scientist, and former U.S. nuclear submarine commander.

He has used Russian MIR submersibles to dive to the wrecks of the *Titanic* and the German battleship *Bismarck*, and has lectured on voyages to most parts of the world. He holds advanced degrees in Physical Geology, Polar Studies, and International Affairs and has taught at the University of Colorado, Boulder, and at the U.S. Naval War College.



Maxim Tarnowsky is a specialist in Ukrainian language and history at the University of Toronto, where he has taught since 1987. An American citizen whose parents immigrated to

the U.S. during World War II, he has a Ph.D. from Harvard and an undergraduate degree from the University of Pennsylvania. Professor Tarnawsky has taught a very wide range of graduate and undergraduate courses on Ukrainian literature and culture, from general historical surveys to specialized seminars on the literature of post-independence Ukraine.

The Black Sea was a busy waterway on the crossroads of the ancient world: The Balkans to the West, the Eurasian steppes to the north, Caucasus and Central Asia to the East, Asia Minor and Mesopotamia to the south, and Greece to the southwest. The region has witnessed the rivalries of Hittites, Carians, Thracians, Greeks, Persians, Scythians, Romans, Byzantines, Goths, Huns, Avars, Bulgars, Slavs, Venetians, Tatars, Ottomans, and Russians. The Black Sea was also significant naval theatre of World War I and saw both naval and land battles of World War II. For millennia, it's been a region of commingling for those whose cultures and ethnicities are not so easily defined on imperial maps.

Please join us as we discover this fascinating region, so often neglected in our mental geographies, yet so crucial to the fortunes of world history. Twenty years after the end of the Cold War, we'll gain extraordinary insights regarding the emerging cultures of Eastern Europe – even as we explore some of the ancient ruins and medieval churches that successive civilizations have layered in Romania, Ukraine, and Turkey.

Sailing from Athens, call first in Constanta, Romania's main port, to explore the ruins of Tomis Danubius. Discover Ukraine's Odessa, a city rich in 19th-century architecture, including the famous Potemkin Steps, as well as Yalta and Sevastopol, crucible of the Crimean War. Before concluding in Istanbul, sail to the seldom-visited north coast of Turkey to explore Trabzon, and the nearby Sumela Monastery, built in a splendid setting, as well as the soaring citadel of ancient Amasya.

Throughout your journey aboard the all-suite, 114-guest *Corinthian II*, enjoy lectures and discussions with two excellent study leaders. **Captain Alfred McLaren** will discuss the cultural and natural history of the Black Sea, while **Maxim Tarnowsky** will focus more on contemporary issues in the region. Also, performing onboard will be legendary pianist/conductor **Leon Fleisher** and his musical family. We are sharing this voyage with travelers from several educational institutions, including the American Museum of Natural History and Smithsonian.

The Black Sea has been a bridge between East and West for centuries. Please join us next summer as we explore this captivating region, enjoying incredible concerts and expert-led talks along the way.

Wednesday, July 18 ■ USA
Fly from the U.S. to Athens, Greece.

Thursday, July 19 ■ ATHENS, Greece | PIRAEUS | EMBARK

Upon arrival in Athens, transfer to Piraeus to board *Corinthian II*. (D)

Friday, July 20 • AT SEA
Attend lectures while sailing toward
Romania. (B, L, D)

Saturday, July 21 • CONSTANTA, Romania
Arrive in Constanta, Romania's main port.
A tour of the city will include the Ruins of
Tomis Danubius, the Archaeological and
National History Museum, the Archaeology

Park, the Orthodox Cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul, and Piata Ovidiu, the central square of the old quarter, where you will have time at leisure. (B, L, D)

Sunday, July 22 • ODESSA, Ukraine
Stroll through Odessa's elegant leafy
streets, lined with stately mansions.
Discover its prime landmarks, including
the grand, Viennese Baroque-style Opera
House; the historic Potemkin Steps, site
of the 1905 uprising of workers and sailors
from the battleship *Potemkin*; and the
Archaeological Museum. In the afternoon,
you will have the chance to meet with local
families in their homes or enjoy time at
leisure in the city. (B, L, D)

Monday, July 23 ■ SEVASTOPOL I CHERSONESOS I BAKHCHYSARAY

Arrive in Sevastopol, a beautiful port city and the former base of the Russian Black Sea Fleet from the days of Catherine II until the fall of the Soviet Union. Drive to nearby Chersonesos, an ancient city founded by Greeks in the 5th century B.C. that became a prosperous trading post. Return to Sevastopol to visit the Panorama Museum, featuring a circular, three-dimensional work of art depicting the defense of the city during the Crimean War. In the afternoon, enjoy time at leisure in Sevastopol, or alternatively, drive to the Crimean interior to explore Bakhchysaray, the seat of the Tatar state from the 16th to the 18th centuries. Visit the imperial Khan's Palace, built in 1519. (B, L, D)

Tuesday, July 24 - YALTA

In the mid-19th century, the Russian imperial family chose Yalta for its summer residence, and almost overnight the town mushroomed into an elegant and popular resort. Tour the Alupka Palace, a stunning 19th-century edifice with both English Tudor and Byzantine embellishments, and Anton Chekhov's House. After lunch at a local restaurant, visit the Livadia Palace, famed site of the 1945 Yalta Conference among Roosevelt, Churchill, and Stalin, and attend a private concert at its Organ Hall. (B, L, D)

Wednesday, July 25 ■ TRABZON, Turkey | SUMELA MONASTERY

Trabzon, the ancient Trapezus, lies on a small tableland between two deep ravines, and was one of antiquity's greatest cities and commercial centers. Founded by Greek colonists during the early part of the 1st millennium B.C., it continued to prosper under the Romans and Byzantines, reaching its golden age in the 13th and 14th centuries. Travel to the Sumela Monastery, founded in the 4th century and situated high in the mountains in a spectacular setting. Back in Trabzon, visit the city's most stunning church, the 13th-century Hagia Sophia, and spend time at leisure exploring the city, known throughout Turkey for its silver workshops. (B, L, D)

Thursday, July 26 - SAMSUN | AMASYA

From Samsun, drive to Amasya, which (legend has it) was founded by the Amazon queen

Amasis. Admire its setting amid a narrow gorge on the Iris River, flanked by cliffs. Ascend to the clifftop fortress for panoramic views and probe the rock tombs of the Pontic kings, which were carved into the cliff. Also visit the 15th-century Sultan Beyazit Mosque, whose buttressed domes and columns commend it as an architectural hallmark, before savoring lunch at a hilltop restaurant with postcard-perfect views. Visit the Archaeological Museum in Samsun before returning to the ship. (B, L, D)

Friday, July 27 - AT SEA

Spend the day at sea enjoying the ship's amenities and attending lectures. (B, L, D)

Saturday, July 28 • ISTANBUL | DISEMBARK | USA Disembark in Istanbul and transfer to the airport for return flights to the U.S. (B)

Optional Athens & Istanbul Extensions

Tour the principal sights of Athens (precruise) and/or Istanbul (post-cruise). 


